

- Monitor safety
- Time-limited services
- Expenditure and outcome reporting





Candidate for Foster Care

Child is at imminent risk of out of home placement

Absent effective preventive services, foster care placement is the planned arrangement for the child

Service plan was developed jointly with child and parents/guardians

Description of services offered or provided to prevent the removal of the child from the home

Case is actively being managed to maintain child in the home or with kinship caregivers to prevent placement in foster care

Child needs a title IV-E prevention service and the service is available

Virginia's Family First EBPs

Multisystemic Therapy (MST)

• 12-17 – youth conduct issues, substance abuse, & court involvement

Functional Family Therapy (FFT)

• 11-18 – youth conduct issues & disruptive behaviors, and family conflict

Parent-Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT)

• 2-7 – child aggression and safety concerns

Brief Strategic Family Therapy (BSFT)

• 6-17 – dysfunctional family patterns and parental mental health or SUD

Family Check-Up (FCU)

• 2-17 — mild/moderate child behavior concerns and disengaged family members

Homebuilders (HB)

• 0-18 — constant crisis and unstable living situation

High Fidelity Wraparound (HFW)

• 0-21 – complex mental health needs and need for services

Motivational Interviewing (MI)

• Caregivers – substance use disorder, child welfare involvement, & barriers to improvement

Basics of Motivational Interviewing (MI)

"MI is a collaborative, goal-oriented style of communication with particular attention to the language of change. It is designed to strengthen personal motivation for a commitment to a specific goal by eliciting and exploring the person's own reasons for change within an atmosphere of acceptance and compassion"







Realize the generational impact of trauma

Recognize the signs in self and others

Adjust policies and procedures to center families

Prevent re-traumatization by acknowledging that harm happened



Secondary impact of EBPs

✓ Burnout prevention

Supervision + outcome monitoring = Guidance





Level of engagement determines additional funding






Tips for Providers



EBP Saturation


Number of teams or sites, as of August 2023






FCU Coverage

as of August 2023




BSFT Coverage

MST and FFT Teams in Virginia








EBP PRACTITIONER REGISTRY




EBP FINDER




Community Pathways

"Any mechanism or avenue that families can use to access title IV-E funded prevention services outside the traditional child welfare service delivery and case management context."



FY2023 Expenditures



BENEFITS OF COMMUNITY PATHWAYS

Serves families outside of the child welfare system

Allows families to voluntarily receive prevention services by trusted providers in their community with no direct on-going child welfare involvement

Leverages federal title IV-E funding through Family First for the prevention services provided

Supports a paradigm shift to build community capacity to strengthen families upstream and prevent maltreatment & child welfare involvement

Promotes collaboration across family-serving systems to develop an integrated & more holistic network for families and communities





New Federal Guidance

"When designing title IV-E prevention plans, we encourage jurisdictions to consider how to use the flexibilities that the Social Security Act provides, including in terms of how to define 'foster care candidate,' so that title IV-E agencies and their community partners can provide title IV-E prevention services to as many eligible individuals and families as possible."

ACF Dear Colleague Letter 2/28/2023

"States and tribes have the flexibility to define and operationalize the concept of 'imminent risk' in a way that fits within the scope and goals of the agency's 5-year title IV-E prevention plan, consistent with the statute."

Child Welfare Policy Manual

"There is no requirement in the statute that the title IV-E agency have an open child welfare case for a child who is receiving title IV-E prevention services. The title IV-E agency, however, must still meet the requirements of the agency's title IV-E prevention 5-year plan regarding these children."

Family First OKR (SFY 2024)

Ambition: Implement Community Pathways (in support of the Family First Prevention Services Act) in order to prevent unnecessary child welfare involvement

Objective: Develop infrastructure for Community Pathways that invests title IV-E funding into evidence-based services that prevent unnecessary child welfare involvement

Result: Completion of needs assessment

Result: Creation of partnerships

Result: Establish a framework for Community Pathways
