


Systems of Care

There is a growing body of evidence showing that the philosophy and values embodied in a system of care approach are producing remarkable outcomes for youth and families while at the same time reducing the need for more costly and restrictive placements.



Virginia's Comprehensive System of Care



Blended and Braided Funding

Financial structure encourages effective and efficient use of all available resources and maximization of federal funding streams. Access to available funding resources is available in one place and through one mechanism.



Coordinating funds

• Blending funds – fund streams are melded into a single "pot" where one can no longer be distinguished from another.

 Braiding funds – fund streams are woven together and used in coordinated fashion.

- Department of Education (private special education)
- Department of Social Services (foster care)
- Department of Juvenile Justice (special placements)
- Department of Behavioral Health and Developmental Services (bed purchase)
- Interagency Consortium

Braid funds locally

To utilize resources effectively

To maximize federal funds

- To "stretch" community's resources
 - Serve as many youth as possible
 - Reduce/eliminate "cracks"
 - Fill service gaps



Braid funds locally

- To establish consistency
 - Standard practice models
- To ensure child's needs, not funds, drive services

 To facilitate access to funds, i.e., resources are available in one place/via one process



Designing a Strategic Financing Plan

Identify core funding streams

Understand scope of services available

Understand financing needs

 Identify and recognize federal/state requirements for use of funds



Design a Strategic Financing Plan

- Assess gaps between needs and funding
 - Age
 - Eligibility
 - Service limitations

Identify strategies for implementation



Compliance with Laws/Policies

Structures the state's financing plan

Ensures maximization of federal funds

- Regulatory consistency
 - Safety of youth
 - Rights of youth and families
 - Oversight of facilities and services
