Family First Prevention Services Act

The vision for Family
First is to keep children
safe, strengthen
families, and reduce the
need for foster care
whenever it is safe to do
so.





Family First Prevention Services Act (FFPSA)

- **FFPSA (Feb 2018):** Historic reforms to child welfare funding through Title IV-E prevention funding.
- **Focus:** Emphasizes family preservation by funding evidence-based, traumainformed programs.
- Target: Provides services to children who are at risk of entering foster care, as well as parents and kin caregivers.
- Eligibility: Services must be listed in the Title IV-E Prevention Services Clearinghouse and align with Virginia's Federal Prevention Plan.

Reduces need for congregate care


Strengthens family functioning and reducing risk factors


Improves mental health and reduces substance use

All three items are required to document IV-E eligibility in the child welfare information system

Requirements of MOA/Contract

- Maintain EBP certification and training
- Maintain CQI process and fidelity monitoring
- Identify child client as Candidate for Foster Care in treatment plan
- Monitor and provide reports on progress
- Work with VDSS, OCS and CEP-Va to monitor outcome measures and data
- Abide by established rate for IV-E
 Prevention funding reimbursement

Child needs one of the EBP (MST, FFT, PCIT, FCU, HB, BSFT, HFW) Establish contract/MOA with EBP providers (between agency and provider) **Purchase of Service** Agreement (child specific) EBP provider submits data to LDSS and Virginia CEP-Va LDSS submits monthly IV-E expenditures (LEDRS) T4E file Reimbursement of EBP through LASER QAA Review of In-**Home Cases**

Family First Workgroup

Purpose: To engage community partners and LDSS to assist with ongoing Family First implementation efforts and build out Community Pathways. The workgroup will review implementation efforts, discuss barriers/challenges, brainstorm solutions, identify next steps and ongoing supports.

Goals:

- Assist in finalizing the new Candidate for Foster Care definition
- Discuss and map Community Pathways (though new candidacy definition)
- Identify additional EBPs to implement
- Create steps/vision for writing new Prevention Plan

>> Prioritized activities for EBP expansion


- Provide education to both providers and LDSS

- Identified touch points of families before they become involved with child welfare
 - Discussed potential barriers, referrals sources and funding streams

- Opening of In-Home cases
- Clarifying misconceptions between LDSS and CSA
 - DSS manages IV-E
 - Services can begin before FAPT/MDT process
 - Consultative FAPT process
- Focus on MDTs and establishing a consultative FAPT process
- Prioritization of funding streams- IV-E can/should be utilized before CSA
- Identifying available providers in the area through the <u>ebpfinder.org</u>
- Recruitment of additional providers

Family First In-Home Subgroup

Purpose: Identify strategies to increase the use evidence-based programs (EBPs) and title IV-E funding.

Goals:

- Identify strengths, challenges and opportunities for practice changes around:
 - Understanding of EBPs and educating families about EBPs
 - Assessing the family's appropriateness for an EBP
 - Accessing title IV-E funding for EBPs
 - Incentivizing LDSS to utilize IV-E and EBPs
- Propose enhanced or new practices to increase utilization of IV-E funding and EBPs



In-Home Subgroup Outcomes/Recommendations

EBP decision trees/workflows EBP job aids to incorporate CANS verbiage Continue with current CANS policy, but focus on adaptive approach Family Team Meeting/MDT to review IV-E funded EBPs as a best practice More education needed around IV-E funding stream and processes



In-Home Services and Family First

The primary goal of In-Home Services is to support families to safely maintain children in their own homes or with relative/fictive kin caregivers in their own communities, by addressing identified safety and risk concerns and reducing the reoccurrence of child maltreatment.

This is achieved through engagement of the family, support systems, and other service providers.

Currently Family First Title IV-E Prevention Funding can only be utilized with families being served through In-Home Services.



 - False: FAPT review for IV-E funded EBPs is a curtesy review. They are providing a consultation and can recommend additional services if needed. If the FSS believes the EBP is needed, then the service can begin
- >> True/False: IV-E prevention funds are managed the same way as CSA funding
 - False: CSA may or may not manage the IV-E funds depending on the LDSS business practices. The goal of IV-E funding is to be provided to the LDSS for families to quickly access services. LDSS can monitor and manage this funding
