

Parenting Sense of Competence Scale

The Parenting Sense of Competence Scale (PSOC) consists of three subscales: Self-Efficacy, Satisfaction, and Interest.


Average PSOC Results

	Overall	Self-Efficacy	Satisfaction	Interest
Baseline	56.7	26.0	21.5	9.3
Discharge	62.5	29.6	23.1	9.8

Overall scores on the Parenting Sense of Competence Scale increased by an average of 5.76 points from baseline to discharge collection.

At the time of transition from ICC, all parents who completed the PSOC reported feeling Moderate to High levels of parental self-efficacy

Parental Self-Efficacy Subscale



Families served in Central Region

Start of Grant (January 2014)

- Only Richmond had ICC services
- 9 Families were receiving ICC services

1.5 Years Later (Current)

- Richmond, Chesterfield, Goochland, and Henrico are utilizing ICC services
- 68 families have received ICC services



Next Steps.....

- Parent Support Partner local coach
- Parent Support Partner Fee for Service is open in Northern Virginia and Central Virginia
- Examine data and course correct our systems
- How do we do more youth support
- Applying HFW/SOC to other systems (other systems other than just mental health)
- In Central Virginia we have 2 coaches in training
